We will not forget those we have lost this year. For a small community the toll has been heavy. Our thoughts and support are given to their families and friends.



#### Report on Community Council and Village Hall Matters

On re-reading what I wrote for last year's newsletter the last 12 months just seems like "Groundhog Day" or should that be "Groundhog Year". The pandemic just seems to go on and on but hopefully with first, second and now booster vaccine jabs one hopes the effects on the individuals unfortunate to contract the virus will be less severe.

With the Village Hall being closed the Community Council met online via "Zoom" from January to April.

These meetings were set up by Cllr. Ross



Very few planning applications had to be dealt with in the early part of the year and the pandemic put a hold on the County Council's Local Development Plan No.2 and this has been further delayed due to a Natural Resources Wales Directive on phosphate levels in river catchment areas such as the Cleddau requiring re-evaluation of potential development sites. The Community Council and many residents objected to the siting of a contractors depot on agricultural land adjacent to but outside the village development boundary for Freystrop Cross. Despite these objections the County Council approved the application seemingly ignoring the Community Council's and residents' concerns which were based on valid planning grounds.

Speeding issues continue to be a real bugbear throughout the village and fortunately the "Go Safe" and volunteer camera teams are attending our area on a more frequent basis. The persistence of C. Cllr. Michael John has finally resulted in the speed limits at Troopers Inn cross roads being reduced from 50 to 40mph. Despite warning signage at either end of Targate Road large vehicles are frequently getting stuck at Targate Corner causing consequential damage to adjacent properties.

In May 2022 there will be Community Council (and County Council) elections. So if any resident aspires to become a Community Councillor and wants to know more about local democracy they are welcome to attend our monthly meetings over the coming months.

The Village Hall reopened after the second lockdown on 17th May and the Children's Drama, Yoga and Crochet Groups all returned soon afterwards. Pembrokeshire College also booked the hall for a series of First Aid courses and these are continuing. A weekly Taekwondo group for juniors meets in the hall on Monday afternoons, the Craft Group are there on Tuesday afternoons and a Latin American Line-Dancing Group meet on Friday evenings. The Freystrop and District WI have now re-started their monthly meetings but they now meet in the afternoon rather than the evening on the second Wednesday of the month. Hopefully the Short Mat Bowls will be re-starting soon with friendly matches. A full list of bookings is displayed in the notice board outside the hall each month.

BDS - the Contractors for the new housing development off New Road - are providing a much-needed extension to the rear carpark at the hall which should be available to use shortly.

As you will read elsewhere in this newsletter an enthusiastic team of volunteers has been set up to improve the state of the Playing Field and Childrens Play Area on Targate Road. Their first aim is to make substantial improvements in time to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee with a Village Festival in June 2022.

Finally on behalf of your Community Council, the Village Hall and Playing Field Management Committee and C. Cllr. Michael John may I wish residents both old and new a happy and peaceful Christmas with the sincere hope that 2022 will not be another "Groundhog Year".

County Council Report by Cllr Michael John

Speeding and road safety

continues to be a regular issue raised in the village, and rightly of very high concern to many

residents.

The Community Speed watch team, at a recent visit to Freystrop Cross, reported 16 offences in an hour, the highest being 52 and 57mph.
At a previous visit there were 32 offences recorded.
There are also issues on Targate Road and at Little Milford Road amongst others. Troopers Inn has now been reduced from 50 to 40mph which is welcome, following several accidents at the crossroads.

I am in regular dialogue with the highway team at PCC, and with Freystrop Community Council, and will be continue to press for positive actions wherever possible.

I would urge anyone who witnesses any traffic incidents or any near misses to report them directly on 101.

308 Bus Service

Many people have commented recently over the reduced bus service, especially with no Saturday buses. I have been told alterations to the timetable can be considered in the New Year, with any potential changes from Easter onwards.

It would be useful therefore if those who miss the service provide the details of which journeys/days they were previously using, and which services they would use again. The building and sports complex will be a huge asset for the area and is due to open in September 2022.

#### <u>SCAMS</u>

There are always a great number of scams doing the rounds, and I would always advise caution if you are unsure who you are talking to, or exchanging emails with. Always ask for identification from any cold callers and check if any emails and offers are authentic.

All 16 & 17 year-olds will be able to vote in next May's Local Council

Elections.

Although able to vote in the Welsh Government elections 2021, this will be the first chance to have your say in Local Government elections. This is the opportunity to choose who represents you in the County Council, and who will put your voice and views forward. To be eligible to vote you will need to register at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote, or for more information look at pembrokeshire.gov.uk/elections-and-voting/first-time-voter.

2nd Home Council Tax

Pembrokeshire Council recently made the decision to raise the levy on 2nd homes from 50% to 100%. This is the only measure available to County Councils, and is intended to combat the increase in 2nd home ownership in the county, which has seen an increase since the pandemic. Pembrokeshire has the 2nd highest number of 2nd homes in Wales, and it is not limited to the holiday coastal area. Inland villages, especially around the Cleddaŭ Estuary, <u>h</u>ave also seen a big increase. This raises the costs, and reduces the housing available to people wishing to remain in thèir lòcal area. 75% of the money raised will go into building social housing in the county.

The other 25% of funds raised will continue to go to the Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant which uses the funds for local and county wide projects. Information on the grant

and eligibility can be found at pembrokeshire.gov.uk/grants/the-enhancing-pembrokeshire-grant.

Welsh Government also have a consultation on this which is open until 17th November, and can be found at gov.wales/ consultation-local-taxes-second-homes-and-self-catering-accommodation-html. It is hoped new legislation will be considered by WG following their review. A suggestion would be that new build properties cannot be used as 2nd or holiday homes, or that planning permission is required for change of use?

#### **The History Plaque**

The History Plaque depicts scenes from the history of Congregationalism. Congregationalism in Wales began in the reign of Elizabeth I.

It is distinctive in proclaiming the Priesthood of all Believers, and in maintaining the independence of the local Church from central control.

Bethel belongs to the Congregational Federation which was formed in 1972 when the old Congregational Church in England and Wales was dissolved in order to make way for the formation of the United Reformed Church.

This ceramic plaque by local artist Paul Webb was unveiled in August 2000.

Services at Bethel are normally held fortnightly. Contact Esme Utting for details.





#### From our Past: 1900, The Reopening of the American Pit

#### **COAL IN PEMBROKSHIRE**

#### OPENING AN ANTHRACITE MINE NEAR HAVERFORDWEST

A mining venture of great possibilities is being made in central Pembrokeshire, a county which possesses of unworked anthracite coal as many as 215 millions of tons, and that of a superior quality.

The length of the coalfield from Amroth to St Bride's Bay is nearly twenty miles. Commencing at Amroth, the coal runs to Landshipping, crosses under the Cleddau to Hook, and goes on through Freystrop, Cardmaker's Pool (the site of the present pit), Johnston (where the Great Western crosses the field), Bolton Hill, Solberry, Walton West, Little Haven, Broad Haven, Haroldston and Druidston, Nolton, Trefrane, and Southwood, and terminates at Newgale and Eweston, north of Roch Bridge.

It is stated by an expert that the quantity of coal left unworked in the Freystrop, Johnston and Cardmaker's Pool district is undoubtedly enormous.

In the sixteenth century this coalfield was widely known, statistics, incomplete as they then were, recording that anthracite coal was exported from Milford, whilst up to the present even small collieries at Hook, Freystrop and Saundersfoot are worked with some success. That at Hook has a fairly good reputation, but through want of capital, or enterprise, or for some other cause, the coal measures have not been been worked on that thorough scale which can alone command success. Culm has of course been dug up in large quantities, and is now sold in the neighbourhood at about 10 shillings a ton.

One of the ablest engineers in Glamorganshire, about [1895], obtained a lease of the minerals in this district. There is now a strong probability that the proposed connection of the Western portion of the Pembrokeshire coalfield with the main line of railway will initiate and develop a lucrative patent smokeless fuel industry. With the exception of a few collieries at Hook, Nolton and Saundersfoot the whole of the coalfield has been practically unworked.


The new colliery which is being opened is near Freystrop, a village about one mile and a half from the Johnston Station of the Great Western Railway, the exact site being a place called Cardmaker's Pool [Farm]. The site of the pit, which is known locally as the American Pit, it having been worked, it is said, during the time of the American War, but one morning the wooden staging caught fire, with the

The first task of the new venture is to open-up this old pit. At the present only a few men have been engaged by the agent to start the concern, but it is hoped that in about 12 months' time possibly 200 men will be wanted there. Men are now engaged in laying down the necessary plant in the shape of engines and boilers which have already arrived on the ground.



It is proposed also to construct a private line of railway from the new colliery to the Great Western Line, joining the main track a little above Johnston Station. This connecting line will be of the greatest importance to the company, as it will put the pit within about three miles and a half of Milford Haven and its docks.

The land is owned by Sir Charles E.G. Philipps Bart., of Picton Castle, mayor of Haverfordwest; Sir Owen H.P. Scourfield Bart., of Williamstown; and the Misses Mansel, of Bath, and was leased by them to Messrs D. Evans and F.M. Hann.

The new company has been registered as the Freystrop Colliery Company (Limited). It has a capital of £16,750 in £10 shares.

In September 1901 it was reported that a seam of anthracite had been struck at a depth of 65 yards. The vein was fully 5ft. in thickness. A second shaft was being sunk. 70 were employed at this time and work on the railway line was to commence.

## Freystrop Fare Migiod

(Migiod Sir Benfro / Pembrokeshire Buns)

These small buns, known also as cace, were given to children as part of their calennig (New Year's gift) on New Year's Day in many districts in Pembrokeshire. They would be baked in large quantities for this special occasion and the children would carry them home in clean pillowcases on their backs.

Generally, each child would be given some two cakes at every house after wishing the members of the household a very happy New Year. These wishes were frequently conveyed in verse or song.

This was certainly a tradition in this area. J.J.R. Phelps, a former headmaster of Freystrop VC School, recalled in an edition of the Pembrokeshire Magazine "it was the custom to have a bake before Christmas and New Year. Rich yeast cakes were baked in different shapes and sizes".

#### Ingredients

- 675g flour
- 1 tsp yeast

- 75g sugar25g lard25g butter60g currants
- 30g candied peel275 ml warm milk
- 1 egg
- pinčň salt
- honey to glaze

#### wists:

- Use a mixture of flours
- Brown molasses can replace the sugar
- Vary the dried fruits
- Add more candied peel

#### Method

- All ingredients are best incorporated at room temperature or warmer.
- Rub the fat into the flour and add the other dry ingredients.
- Dissolve the yeast in a little of the warm milk and pour into a well in the centre of the dry mixture.
- Beat the egg and add to the milk.
   Add the milk mixture gradually and work with the yeast into the dry ingredients to make a soft dough. You may not need all of the milk.
  - Leave to rise in a warm place for about an hour.
  - Then knead on a floured board, and divide to form small balls.
- Roll them out lightly with a rolling pin and allow to rise again until doubled in size.
  - Bake in a hot oven 200 c, 15 to 20 mins until golden brown.
  - Brush with melted honey to glaze.
