Freystrop Community Council

Having started the year 'business as usual' ill health has meant that Chair David Thomas has had to step aside from duties and Esme Utting take over as Acting Chair. It is pleasing to report that at the time of writing David's health is improving and Councillors and clerk look forward to his speedy recovery.

Community Council Audits

Audit Wales finally returned their deliberations on the Council audits for 2019/20 and 2021/22. Clean bills of health were noted. In August the documentation for the very first Full Audit of FCC were submitted for investigation. Council knows of one area of failure which was pointed out to Audit Wales and is already being addressed. It is hoped that this is the only item of 'interest'. Speeding

This remains a constant complaint from residents. FCC encourage all residents to report incidents to 101. Traffic monitoring will only take place when reports from individuals become significant. The clerk to FCC has application forms for any resident to apply to volunteer to join the Community Speedwatch Scheme. The costs of installing radar speed signs have been investigated by

Councillors. The costs have been found to be far more than the costs of signage. Infrasture installation and planning vastly

increase the costs. Funding will be sought in 2024.

Community Review

Pembrokeshire County Council are reviewing community arrangements within Pembrokeshire as part of their statutory

dutieš.

Initial proposals would see the merger of several Community Councils in 2027. Freystrop Community Council is one that is affected and would become a part of Hook Community Council. Both Hook and Freystrop Community Councils are opposed to this

merger.

The Boundary Commission for Wales is currently carrying out a consultation which ends on 13 December. If any resident registered elector has any comments on the proposal, either for or against, they may submit their comments in writing/email to any Councillor or clerk to be included in FCC's response. The Boundary Commission will only accept written evidence.

This review highlights the importance of all those eligible to vote registering as an elector whether they wish to use their democratic right to vote or not. So many decisions are based on the total

nŭmbers.

Freystrop Village Hall

Major subsidence has been observed in the hall's structure. Insurer's have refused to cover the cost of the substantial repairs required citing evidence of problems existing for over 15 years. The works planned for 2023 have been abandoned. FCC is determined that Freystrop will not lose a hall as a valued community asset and is working hard to provide the best solution.

County Council Report by Cllr Michael John

Review of Town & Community Councils in Pembrokeshire Local Democracy and Boundary Commission for Wales are reviewing the Town & Community Councils of Pembrokeshire with view а considering and formulating proposals for their future arrangements. could see the reduction of councils or The Commission some mergers. would welcome any comments on their proposals in the consultation which residents may wish to make. The 8week consultation period began on the 23 October 2023 and closes on 17 December 2023. The Commission will consider any representations made to them during the consultation period before thev collate their Draft Proposals.

Review of Polling Stations
Local Authority is conducting this regular review and is keen to hear what electors think about the convenience of polling stations used for elections.

The Council welcomes the views of all residents, and anyone wishing to make comments or suggestions should, if possible, give alternative venues that could be used as polling places.

Information regarding the current arrangements and proposals for changes can be found on PCC's "have your say" page or can be seen at: Electoral Services, Unit 23, Thornton Industrial Estate, Milford Haven, SA73 2RR. Comments can be added online

or by email. Closing date for any comments is 1st December 2023.

Don't lose your right to vote Residents are being asked to check their registration details to ensure they are correct. The annual canvass allows PCC to keep the electoral register up to date. More people can vote in Welsh elections than ever before, so this is an important opportunity to update the register. Also, anyone over 16 can vote in Welsh Government and Senedd elections. The easiest way to check you are registered or update is online at: www.gov.uk/register-to-vote

Also, it should be noted that there is now a legal requirement to show photo identification when voting at some elections. Anyone who does not have an accepted form of photo ID can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. More information is available via The Electoral Commission website.

Welsh Government 20 mph roll out This was implemented in September as planned and has brought a large response across the County and Wales. Whilst 20mph may suit many narrow roads in the area, there are some where the need for 20mph would seem debatable. The council has the power to make "exception" roads and if anyone has any comments, please feed these back to PCC and they can consider reviewing those areas.

A new Youth Enterprise Fund offers young entrepreneurs and their businesses a funded start-up arant bν the Government's Shared Prosperity Fund. PCC has an Economic Development Officer set up to promote the new funding, and support people with their application and sourcing other business support. The aim of the fund is to support applicants aged 16 to 21 to create new businesses in the county. Grants between £250 and £1,000 are available, and each award will be based on 50% of eligible costs. 2nd Home & Empty Property Council Tax A consultation has recently been undertaken regarding these two taxes following a change in legislation from Welsh Government. Following the consultation, options are being discussed within PCC and any alterations could be implemented as part of the budget setting process for the 2024-25 tax year. PCC currently adds a 100% levy to 2nd homes but the new legislation allows for up to 300%. Welsh Government have also changed legislation for holiday lets implementing a 182-day rule to be eligible for small business rates. If anyone has any queries on these, please give me a call.

The Fflecsi Bus Service has now been operating for several months and offers a more flexible service. The existing 308 07.45am and 04:10pm journeys remain in place and do not need to be booked. Other trips do need to be booked and can be made up to 1 month in advance, either using the App or through the Contact Centre (03002340300). It enables travel to/ from locations in Neyland, Milford Haven and the West Coast. Also, anywhere within Haverfordwest. Those who have mobility issues can be designated Door 2 Door Passengers and can be picked up from their property (if suitable for the bus) and taken directly to their required destination. It is also available on Saturdays.

Bookings are prioritised based on first come first served. The system will try to book people onto existing bookings if they are within 1 hour of each other.

WISE (Waste Investigations Support & Enforcement) have been appointed by PCC to tackle a range of environmental crimes that have a negative impact on the county. Fixed Penalty Notices can be issued for littering, dog fouling and breach

of byelaws relating to dogs on beaches. The aim is to drive behaviour change in the small percentage of people who cause a big impact on the local environment. By issuing these Fixed Penalty Notices, the message sent is that this sort of behaviour will not be tolerated. Any problem areas can be emailed to:

enviro-crime@pembrokeshire.gov.uk to highlight areas of particular concern.

Pembrokeshire County Council is ceasing the <u>provision of grey bags</u> and reverting to each household providing their own black bags for residual, (non-recyclable) waste collections. The provision of grey bags was introduced in 2019 along with major changes to the waste collection service, which has seen Pembrokeshire named the best county in Wales for recycling for the last 3 years. However, as part of saving measures agreed in March, no further deliveries of grey bags will be made.

Households will continue to be able to place out 3 bags of residual waste every 3 weeks, and there is no change to the other recycling arrangements or collection days.

The move to end the provision of grey bags brings Pembrokeshire into line with the vast majority of Welsh Local including neighbouring Authorities, Cerediaion and Carmarthenshire Councils who also require households black bags for nonto provide recvclable waste collections. Residents should continue to use up any existing grey bags as normal and then use standard black bin bags (60litres) for non-recyclable once their grey ones are used up. information is available via the Waste & recycling pages of the PCC web site.

Working Parties

Willing bands of volunteers has been active throughout the year. It has been a pleasure to mix with a varying crowd of residents.

In March – More native trees were planted along the boundary in an effort

to create a windbreak along the western border. More fruit trees were planted to extend the community orchard. As all trees were very small when planted it will take a few years for them to make a real impact.

In April – The rainbow picnic bench was installed, this has proved popular

for picnics.

In July – A new bench was donated to the field by a local resident. A band of 4 volunteers laid the concrete base and sited the bench facing south. This bench has proved to be very popular as it really is in a lovely spot and is really comfortable. Thank you Jen.



Also in July - The entrance to the new walk through the trees at the bottom of the field was created. This walk had been worked on for a while, the main work had been carried out in an earlier work party by volunteers so it was great to be able to get it opened up. The intention is to continue this path through the trees – perhaps next year, with the help of volunteers.

In August – A net was sourced for the goal post. This is now well used

for practice by all ages!

In September – The field was been visited by a Local Places for Nature Officer and the Regional National Forest Officer from NRW. They were able to make many suggestions and gave some really useful advice on how to manage the site.

The path through the trees has started to be extended, thanks to the working party on 30th September. Trees have been pruned and a number of willows removed to give the oaks more light. A diversion to the normal path was made to avoid the wet corner of the field, whilst being an improvement it is still wet.

In October – The working party concentrated on raking up the cut grass



from the Lane Park meadow areas. This has proved to be a huge task and more work is needed on this. The new entrance to the path extension has been started.

In November – We learned that we will be receiving a grant to extend our community orchard. While this grant includes a small number of trees it will also supply various tools which will be welcome for the continued upkeep of the park as a whole.

Grass Cutting & Paths

Freystrop Village Hall has been funding cutting the grass on the pitch area to make it usable for all. Please do not allow dogs on this area which has been set aside for sports. The grass paths around the perimeter and through the middle of the field are being really

well used. These paths are being cut regularly by a local volunteer.

Ideas & Volunteering

Parc Hamdden Freystrop Recreation Park is for the use of all and while we need to maintain the sports field area suggestions for further improvements on other parts of the field are welcome. If you have any ideas please get in touch. If you can spare a few hours to help please come along. Further work parties are planned.

The 308 bus service now runs only twice a day Monday to Friday: From Freystrop Cross catch the 08:16 to travel to Haverfordwest Bus Station.

From Haverfordwest Bus Station Bay 2 catch the 16:10 to Freystrop.

For a better travel experience use the fflecsi Pembrokeshire service.

It runs 07:30 to 18:30 Monday to Saturday. You can book a bus journey to and from anywhere within the yellow bordered area on the map.



To book, phone 0300 234 0300, Monday to Saturday, 07:00-19:00, and Sunday, 09:00-18:00. Alternatively download the fflecsi app.


Travel passes are accepted but all payments must be by card. On boarding you will asked for your name to check against the booking.

On your day of travel you'll be kept informed of the location and ETA of your bus.

Your pick up spot may vary slightly. At Freystrop Cross the bus may appear from any of 4 directions depending on its last journey and updated bookings.

The Definitive Map and Statement of Public Rights of Way

All public rights of way in Pembrokeshire – footpaths, bridleways and byways are recorded in the Definitive Map and Definitive Statement. If a way is shown on the map then it is conclusive evidence of public rights along the way unless there has been a legally authorised amendment. However, the fact that a way is not shown on the map is not proof that the public has no rights over it and thus, the map may be subject to change.



PCC Definitive Map areas 73, 74, 82 & 83 cover the Freystrop Community. This image covers all 4 areas. A larger image was posted to the Freystrop Facebook Group.

The Definitive map is accompanied by the Definitive Statement. This is a description which may contain more information about individual paths, such as the start and end points, width of the way, etc.

The Definitive Map & Statement is on the PCC website or be inspected at County Hall during normal office hours. No prior appointment is necessary.

Freystrop Fare

BOILED FRUIT CAKE

Many of you will have tasted Mrs Simpson's boiled fruit cake at the Warm Rooms over last winter. This year it's making an appearance at the monthly Get Togethers in the hall.

If the monthly gap is too much to bear here's the recipe for you to get your fix of this delicious cake.



Twists: Use self raising flour if you prefer. BUT reduce the bicarbonate of soda to 1/2 a teaspoon Swop the margerine for butter * Soak your fruit before cooking in an alcohol of čhoice * Up your fruit quantitities by 25g (¹loz) each, or to your preference. It's got to be healthier but only if you skip the álcohol! Serve with salted butter

125g (4oz) Margarine plus a little extra for greasing the tin 175g (6oz) Sugar, dark or light brown or white 175g (6oz) Currants or Raisins 175g (6oz) Sultanas 50g (2oz) (225ml (8 fl oz) Candied peel 1 level teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda 1 heaped teaspoon Mixed Spice' 2 Beaten Eggs 105g (4oz) Plain flour, whole-whéat or white 125g (4oz) Self raising flour. whole-wheat or white Pinch of Salt

Place margarine, sugar, fruit, water, bicarbonate of soda and mixed spice into a saucepan. Bring to the boil and simmer for 1 minute. Pour into large mixing bowl and allow to cool.

Line a 18 cm -7 inch square or 20 cm - 8 inch round tin, or use loaf tins with greaseproof paper. 3. Add eggs, flours and salt to cooled mixture, mix well and pour

into a greased tin.

Ɓake in the centre of a 4. moderate oven, Gas 4, 180 C for 1 $rac{1}{4}$ hours until dárk brown and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Cut into slices to serve.
